A2Success Annual Report 2009

With the completion of the Success Strategy in February, the first order of business for 2009 was to present the Strategy to community groups for validation. The Co-Chairs met with eighteen groups including the Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation, the SPARK Board of Directors, and the Ypsilanti Convention and Visitors Bureau. A2Success was also the topic for discussion at the annual Chamber Impact Event. Over 250 people attended this event and participated in breakout sessions on transit, education, Washtenaw Avenue redevelopment, government efficiency and corporate leadership. We received great feedback on how people might become engaged and how to move forward on new actions.

Eleven Actions are underway with over 190 leaders and experts participating on Action Teams. While many of our actions will take years to complete some actions have already been implemented. The SPARK East incubator opened its doors in March of this year and has 15 tenants ranging from web design companies to alternative energy technologies. The Early College Alliance_{sm} at Eastern Michigan University has expanded and now has 260 high school students earning undergraduate credits at Eastern Michigan University while completing their high school requirements.

In 2010, A2Success will shift its focus from getting the word out to moving the long range strategy forward. Our focus will be on continued progress for actions currently underway and begin work on three additional action items that are critical to our success: K-12 education; corporate involvement; and next generation leadership:

K-12 Education – With the defeat of the education millage, Co-Chair Mark Ouimet met with the Superintendents Association to discuss the importance of pre-K -12 education to A2Success leadership and the community. He also offered our assistance in any way we can to address not only the funding issue but the issue of ensuring highest quality K-12 education in our region. The superintendents are delighted that a large group of community leaders had this as a high priority and the Co-Chairs will continue meeting with this Association to identify the best way we can get other sectors involved in a meaningful way.

Corporate Leadership – Our research shows that communities with engaged private sector leaders have the greatest chance at sustained economic growth. While we have close to 200 leaders working on action teams, fewer than 25% represent the private sector. A priority for 2010 will be to develop an action plan for private sector engagement.

Next Generation Leadership – While we continue to enlist younger leaders, we need to find a way for the leaders of tomorrow to be engaged in a meaningful and sustainable way. Leadership models, communication strategies and other tasks will be developed in 2010 to meet this pressing need.

A snapshot of all the Actions currently underway is contained in this Annual Report. We would like to express our sincere appreciation to those community leaders that have joined an action team and look forward to engaging others in this long-term community effort.

ABOUT A2SUCCESS

A2Success is a long term strategy for achieving sustained economic growth and maintaining our high quality of living in the Ann Arbor Region. What started as a discussion by the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners about what we might do to improve economic conditions in the county, has developed into a broad based community action agenda involving over 190 leaders from the community's private, education, government and not-for-profit sectors.

The A2Success Strategy was developed by over ninety community leaders and experts who evaluated over 65 of our community's existing plans to identify our most important long term goals and researched over 50 other successful regions with sustained economic growth and unique quality of place assets. This research was followed by in depth discussion about a vision for the future and identification of what we need to do as a community to ensure sustained economic growth and quality of place in the future.

Our vision for our region is to be the place where world changing innovation happens. With our world class Universities bringing in over \$1 billion in annual research funding, innovative economic delivery systems, our entrepreneurial spirit and high quality of living, our region has the ability to become the center of innovation in the mid-west.

To achieve this vision, our six Co-Chairs have enlisted champions from many sectors to lead Action Teams. These teams are working diligently to enhance those regional assets needed to succeed in a knowledge-based economy... *developing the best and brightest minds... converting innovative ideas into action... and enhancing our quality of living assets to retain and attract talent and foster innovation.*

SPARK East

Action Outcome

Established in March 2009 as a high-tech business incubator in downtown Ypsilanti. The incubator, known as SPARK East, is leased and operated by Ann Arbor SPARK with an initial five-year term. Reduced rent and business accelerator services will help foster new innovative companies and employment in the area. The new incubator tenants will generate sales for local businesses along Michigan Avenue.

Status

- ✓ SPARK obtained \$1,257,000 for the five-year operating budget from grants and key stakeholders.
- ✓ SPARK East has had 19 physical tenants and 8 virtual tenants since opening in March 2009. Companies range from voice imaging specialist and web design to live video streaming and green pest control.
- ✓ There are 34 jobs associated with SPARK East physical tenant companies.
- ✓ Home to the Shifting Gears program which helps former “big company” employees transition into “new economy” leaders.
- ✓ Revitalized Michigan Avenue building with business occupants and lofts above; daily foot traffic increased by 30 people per week.
- ✓ SPARK East has hosted over 50 events in 2009 including the entrepreneur marketing educational program Marketing Roundtable, career transition Brown Bag lunch series, business launch of Real Kidz, and community events such as “The B Side” graduations.

Develop a transit system that ensures all County residents and workers can get to jobs, lifeline, and leisure activities via transit service.



Status

- ✓ 30+ community leaders interviews to gauge support for public transit and identify other community leaders that might support/oppose transit.
- ✓ Established "Partners for Transit" – a transit support and advocacy organization and created a website and monthly newsletter (<http://www.partnersfortransit.org>) with information on need for regional transit and transit testimonials from the community.
- ✓ AATA adopted a resolution in November to direct staff to take steps toward developing a countywide service plan including transit solutions and funding sources.
- ✓ AATA approved contracting with consultant to develop a detailed service plan with capital, operating and human resource needs.

- ✓ Charter to commit over 30 members from local governments, transportation agencies, chambers, developers and other interest groups to develop a vision and action plan for the corridor.
- ✓ Re-Imagining Washtenaw Avenue Report completed with recommendations to improve the investment environment and retrofit Washtenaw Avenue through zoning incentives, transportation improvements, tax increment financing, fast track development approvals, consolidation and marketing sites.
- ✓ Joint Technical Committee formed by resolutions from the City of Ann Arbor, City of Ypsilanti, Pittsfield Township and Ypsilanti Township, AATA, WCRC and WATS to implement the report recommendations.



Status

Ypsilanti

- ✓ *New Tech High* - The District is one of six districts in the State to receive State grant funding to develop a New Tech High. The District also received \$300,000 in grant funding from the Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation for program development. New Tech High is a national model that focuses on developing science, technology, engineering and mathematics skills. - ✓ Developed a restructuring plan for Ypsilanti High School to:
 - Strengthen teaching and curriculum offerings in all core content areas with an emphasis science, technology, engineering and math,
 - Develop a pre-engineering program in grades 6-10,
 - Add double math options at the middle-school level,
 - Work with the Algebra Project supported by University of Michigan, Eastern Michigan University and Washtenaw Intermediate School District,
 - Redesign the middle and high school class schedules to provide options for focused instruction for any student who is not performing at grade level in a core academic area, and
 - Establish elementary and middle school STEM Academies.

Increase the number of high school students that earn college credits during high school with the Early College AllianceSM; develop skilled workers in key growth areas like science, technology, mathematics and medicine.

Status

- ✓ Participating school districts include Milan, Lincoln, Whitmore Lake, Ypsilanti and Chelsea.
- ✓ Currently 260 students enrolled in the program.
- ✓ Goal is to enroll 150 new students each fall in the ECA program (beginning in the fall of 2011) to reach a maximum of 400-500 students per year enrolled in the program.
- ✓ Grant funding from the Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation was awarded and there is a detailed action plan with milestones.



FATIMA RAFIQ is an Ypsilanti student in her second year at the Early College Alliance Program at Eastern Michigan University. At the end of next semester, she will have taken a total of 50 college credits. And, by the time she completes the ECA program, she plans to have earned a total of 60 college credits.

Fatima says the ECA@EMU has many advantages including getting two years of college credit at no cost, and having an amazing support system right on campus. She says the ECA staff has helped her grow. "They set higher standards for me to reach which challenges me to become a better person. They've also helped me realize that hard work does pay off. They're amazing, educated, open-minded teachers who I wish could be my college professors."

Fatima feels that "every high school student would be so much better prepared for college, if they went through a program such as the ECA because college is not only about grades, it's about a whole new lifestyle."

 - The Center for Empowerment and Economic Development Micro Loan Fund, which will assist existing and start up small businesses who cannot obtain conventional financing.
 - The SPARK—Eastern Washtenaw County Micro Loan Fund, a collaboration between ELG and SPARK whose mission is to support innovative, high-growth start-up companies throughout eastern Washtenaw County as they near commercial viability.
